SUBSTITUTES—A NEW ROLE?

URING a recent match at Stamford Bridge, Marvin Hinton had to leave the field and John Boyle came on as substitute. This occurred just before halftime. John spent the half-time period kicking around and generally warming-up.

The new substitute rule has thrown up the problem of suddenly thrusting a relatively "cold" player into the heat of a match.

My solution is, simply, to make the substitute one of the ball-boys. This has the following advantages:-

(1) Right up until he is needed the substitute is warmed up and, more important, loosened up.

(2) He is mentally adjusted to the pace of the game, the noise of the crowd, etc.

(3) By reason of the fact that a ball-boy has constant contact with ball being used in the match, he is well aware of its playing qualities, its "feel" and other characteristics.

If the opposing team thinks the idea is unfair they could be allowed to have their substitute perform as a ball-boy also.
