

The Talk of Stamford Bridge

IT was unfortunate, to say the least, that Wednesday's League Cup semi-final home leg had to be called off, but after three day's incessant rain Referee Harry New had no option when he inspected the pitch at lunch-time. The match has been re-arranged for Wednesday next (7.45 p.m.), when the original Stand tickets—and the already printed programme, complete with Cup coupon No. 12—will apply. The postponement does not alter our needs against Norwich City today. After six League games without a win, we want both points.

On the mend: At last comes the welcome news that centre-half John Dempsey seems to be winning his battle against the Achilles tendon injury that has kept him out of the first team since the season's second match. Between times, John has managed only two Combination appearances, but at the time of going to press there were hopes that he might be ready for a try-out in the Reserves at Norwich today. Peter Bonetti has been to Spain for a week's convalescence and is due back this week-end. Trainer Harry Medhurst sees him on Monday and hopes then to have some idea when Peter can resume light training following the stomach injury he received in the League Cup at Bury.

New signings: The transfer of Alan Taylor, 18-year-old left-winger from Midland League club Alfreton Town, was completed last week after he had shaped well in five Combination matches during a month's trial with us. Alan was formerly an apprentice with Leicester City but they released him and he joined Alfreton. We have also signed a new apprentice—Derek Richardson, 16-year-old, 6 ft. 1 in. Youth team goalkeeper from Poplar, who left school last week after finishing examinations. He joined us three years ago on schoolboy forms.

First cap: Congratulations to John Phillips on winning his first Under-23 cap for Wales against England at Swansea on Wednesday of last week. John, born at Shrewsbury 21 years ago, qualified for Wales because his late father was born in the Principality, and he decided to accept the Welsh invitation to a cap rather than wait and see whether any England prospects developed. Not nice of England to put three past him on his national debut (Malcolm Macdonald scored them all in the first half), but John still had reason to be satisfied with his game . . . and to hope for bigger honours to come.

Your problems . . . and ours: We knew we were going to face difficulties, particularly this season, when we embarked on our ground redevelopment programme, and many of the match-day problems that Supporters see as theirs we see as ours, too. From letters received, some fans seem to think we "could not care less" about their well-being, but if that were true would we be rebuilding Stamford Bridge?

At the start of the season we asked Supporters to bear with us, and while thanking you for your continued support, we would mention a few specific problems to let you know what is being done—and in some cases how you can help—to ease them.

(1) West Stand turnstiles: We accept that there IS a shortage to cope with the extra demands on that side of the ground. We ARE doing something about it, and hope to have additional 'stiles installed in the next few weeks.

(2) Time of arrival: A spot check at the home game against Crystal Palace showed that from 2.10-2.30 p.m. the turnstiles were almost idle. Then came a rush, with some spectators arriving at 3.15. Present attendances may be smaller than they used to be, but spectators can still help themselves by arriving in good time. This particularly applies to latecomers making for the N.E. Enclosure. Once the game has started, they have to walk round the track, which can be distracting to the players and other spectators. For the same reason, N.E. Enclosure patrons wishing to leave before the end of the match can only do so by the North Terrace exit.

(3) Terrace Supporters: Please do not "bunch" and block off the terraces half-

way down. By your moving to the front, we can feed the terraces from the back.

(4) Toilets: The need for more is a problem which we know exists, one that we are looking into and doing our best to solve.

(5) Ticket complaints: In reply to Season-ticket holders' complaints that we have not accepted postal applications for Cup tickets, this is not always possible because of the time factor, and it does create stress within the Ticket Office when such additional matches fall close to home League fixtures. Many Supporters living a distance away arrange for friends nearer to Stamford Bridge to collect such tickets on their behalf.

(6) Track to N.E. Enclosure: As a temporary measure against the risk of injury to players, the path along the touchline in front of the East Stand working site has been temporarily sanded over. We hope to provide an improved surface in the near future.

Praise for our No. 4: We thought Chelsea fans—and John Hollins—would like to know of a snippet we read last week-end from Leeds manager Don Revie. Asked to name the English League footballer he most admired outside Leeds United, he replied: "John Hollins," and went on: "He is one of the most complete midfield players I have seen. It is a mystery to me why this fellow has not been given an extended run in the England team."

Chelsea's 25 Post-war Seasons in the First Division

PAGE FROM THE PAST: SEASON 1958-59

IN Chelsea's thirteenth post-war League season a final position of fourteenth (a drop of three places) was certainly disappointing after an excellent start which brought 13 points from the first ten matches. An interesting comparison with the efficient defensive systems of today is that those games produced no fewer than 57 goals—30 of them to Chelsea and eleven of them in an incredible 6-5 home win over Newcastle United.

At that stage only Arsenal had found the net more often than ourselves, and already Jimmy Greaves had scored 16 goals—including five in the 6-2 home win against Wolves and three in our 4-1 victory over Nottingham Forest.

For Jimmy this was indeed a golden season and, with 32 goals in 42 League games (he was our only ever-present player that season), he broke the individual Chelsea record of 30 goals in a season by Bob Whittingham in the Second Division in 1910-11. Not surprisingly, after numerous Under-23 appearances Greaves won his first full cap for England on their summer tour, appearing against Peru, Mexico and U.S.A.

October saw Chelsea's good start tossed away. First, a visit to Burnley brought a 0-4 reverse, followed by defeat in the next two matches. By the end of 1958 only five clubs stood below Chelsea in the table, and the last 14 games had produced only eight points. Fortunately, that proved to be the low-water mark and an average of a point per game thereafter kept us out of trouble. But 98 goals conceded was our worst in a season of League football.

The F.A. Cup contained small comfort. After the season's outstanding performance which brought a 4-1 victory against those "Cup Kings of the Fifties," Newcastle United, at St. James's Park in a twice-postponed third round tie, Aston Villa won 2-1 at Stamford Bridge five days later.

The season brought Chelsea's first European venture—in what was known as the International Industries Fairs InterCities Cup, a competition then stretched over two seasons. Chelsea were selected to represent London—the rules of the competition somewhat strangely allowing "not more than three players" from other clubs in the same city to be included. Chelsea used no such reinforcements.

Frem, from Copenhagen, provided the first round opposition and a 7-2 aggregate win resulted (3-1 in Denmark, 4-1 here). Belgrade, however, proved altogether tougher proposition in the following round, and a 1-0 first leg win at Stamford Bridge proved totally inadequate, Belgrade winning the return in Yugoslavia by 4-1.


Despite experience supplied by Reg Matthews, the Sillett brothers, Peter and John, John Mortimore, and Frank Blunstone (fit once more after nearly two seasons' inactivity with a twice-broken leg), the

side was basically a young one.

Among those introduced were Barry Bridges and Bobby Tambling—both scored on their debut in a 3-2 win at home to West Ham on a day in February when the Chelsea forward line was our youngest ever at an average age of 18½. Junior captain and right-back Ken Shellito returned from a successful Youth Tournament in Cannes at Easter to make his League debut in a 3-1 win away to Nottingham Forest.

Cup Tickets: Notice to Season-Ticket Holders

HOME matches, including replays, in the League Cup or F.A. Cup are treated strictly in the order played at this ground. As announced on your season-ticket renewal form, 25% of all seats must be allocated to the visitors and in the circumstances at one out of every four such ties season-ticket holders will not be able to apply for their own seat.

All season-ticket holders were sent, with their book, an S.R.S. ticket which carries details of their door, row and seat number, and in the top left-hand corner a code number. The first two figures, before the / of the code number, determine when you can or cannot apply for your

own seat. The following will show how the system works.



BETWEEN OURSELVES

Programme Editor

BEFORE the League Cup semi-final came to interrupt the train of thought, the question was posed on this page: What is Football going to do to solve the escalating problems of falling attendances and rising costs? I know what I would like it to do. The first requirement is to get the game right on the field, because everything stems from there and that is where, basically, the game is most wrong—in its approach. True, some clubs manage to play with flair away from home, but they are the exceptions. To draw away is still the criterion of most, and I believe the simplest and most effective way of changing tactical attitudes would be to award THREE points for an away win.

Stop away teams playing for a point by making victory so much more worthwhile and you will get two sides going out to attack instead of, usually, one. That must make a better spectacle, switching the emphasis from defence to attack, and spectacle is what the game needs. Bolton manager Jimmy Armfield rightly slammed away teams who play eight defenders in front of the 'keeper when he said: "They should give them a league of their own without goalposts and let them play across the pitch."

I would also like to see the indirect free-kick banished and every foul punished with a direct award. In the "area" that would mean more penalties, leading to more goals which, as we all know, is what Football wants. Come to think of it, whatever happened to penalties? Surely they ought to be more plentiful than bookings, yet in the whole of the First Division this season—we are now at the half-way stage—only 31 goals have been scored from the spot in a total of 218 matches, or one in every seven games. I know a few will have been missed, but shouldn't there be more than 40-odd offences worthy of penalties in four months' First Division play? The indirect free-kick "in the box" is too often a referee's get-out. Away with it.

What more is wrong with modern Football? There is too much of it. There must be when such a sage as Bill Shankly says, as he did after Liverpool and Spurs had drawn their League Cup-tie at Anfield on Monday night: "This was a dreadful result for both sides. Candidly, I wouldn't have minded if we'd lost. The pressure of games is too much on players, too ridiculous for words." It's too much on the fans, too. At increased costs of admission and travel, they cannot be expected to keep stumping up. Something has to give, and it will be interesting to see how today's attendance for Chelsea v. Norwich compares with Wednesday night's League Cup semi-final—the same match in a different wrapper.

The League's Pattern of Football which the clubs spurned ten years ago was on the right lines. And if Arsenal chairman Denis Hill-Wood says he is prepared here and now to vote for a reduction of the First Division to 18 clubs, the lead should be good enough for others. Indeed, why not 18 clubs in each of five divisions—First, Second, Third North, Third Midland and Third South—making a 90-club League in all? Unless many present Third and Fourth Division clubs are to go out of business in the next few years, they must surely regionalise soon. Shorter away trips, smaller travel costs, more crowd-pulling local derbies . . . you know it makes sense.

What else can Football do to help itself? Scrap meaningless tournaments like the Watney Cup, the Texaco Cup, the Anglo-Italian Cup... re-introduce a three-month close-season in summer, so that the fans are once again eager for the start of each new season... insist on a far more lucrative deal from the Pools (I suggest something like £10,000,000 a year for the use of fixtures instead of the absurd £900,000 received at present from an "offshoot" of Football that made its two biggest companies a combined £43,000,000 profit last year and paid the Government £56,000,000 in betting tax). And to counter the increasing danger of too much soccer appearing on the screens at home, Football must revise its deal with TV when the existing contracts expire at the end of season 1973-74.

Most of all, to finish on the field where we started, it must shift the emphasis from the destroyers and stoppers back to the stylists and goalscorers. And I think that awarding three points for an away win would do most to switch the vital area of the pitch away from midfield back to where it used to be. In the goalmouth.





o SSIE has always impressed me with his ice-cool precision in the penalty-box. As a goal-taker he has few equals, yet strangely Ossic rarely opts for a straightforward shot when he races into a goalscoring position inside the box. He will shape to shoot, then having manoeuvred the goalkeeper into a false position he will cut the ball either way, moving to his left or to his right before shooting.

The diagram below illustrates this clearly. Here, Ossie is coming through in the inside-right position with the ball on his right foot. It looks for all the world as though he's going to hit it with his right foot and the goalkeeper positions himself for the shot. It's then that Ossie cuts the ball to his left, moves across the 'keeper and whacks a shot into the unguarded right-hand side of goal. ?
