The Talk of Stamford Bridge

FIFTEEN matches packed into 53 days, starting with tonight's re-arranged fixture with Tottenham, lie before us in our quest for honours in the three major tournaments: League Championship, F.A.

Cup and League Cup.

Victory against Peterborough United put us in the F.A. Cup semi-Finals for the seventh time (the third since the war), so that only 90 more minutes of Cup football are between us and Wembley. Amidst our pleasure at winning on Saturday, we offer commiserations to Peterborough on their misfortune in losing captain Vic Crowe to injury in the second minute. By the fifteenth, we led 3-0 and had reached the semi-Finals without need for a single replay, a situation which must benefit our challenge for the Championship.

The other Sixth Round ties are all being staged tonight, and we hope to relay latest scores to you at half-time and the finish. After Saturday's League visit to Manchester United, we switch to League Cup football here next Monday with the first leg of the Final (provided Leicester do not draw their F.A. Cup-tie at Liverpool tonight).

Saturday's win followed a day of intense snow-clearing activity here. At 10 a.m. on Friday, a 4 in. layer covered the pitch, and playing a match little more than 24 hours later looked improbable, to say the least.

But, in a great team-behind-the-team effort, many hands went to work, and the result was little less than miraculous. To all those, known and unknown, who backed groundsman Chris Payne in this gigantic sweep-and-shovel operation against the clock, our grateful thanks.

They included junior groundstaff and reserve players, office and training staff, members of the greyhound staff, some 30 Army servicemen, four supporters, and local referee Mr. Jack Sturgeon. He came off night shift to inspect the ground at 9 a.m., joined the working party through the day and, by 5 p.m., was able to inform the F.A. that the pitch would be playable.

Our thanks also to Arsenal F.C. for so readily enabling our players to use their indoor gymnasium for training last Thursday afternoon.

Tonight it's back to THE LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP

Villa Park, venue of our F.A. Cup semi-Final, has been good to us in the past in Cup football. In the 1915 semi-Final we defeated Everton 2-0 and went on to our only Final, and in 1952 we beat Leeds 5-1 there in a third match in the 5th Round. And we had a 3-2 League Cup win there in January.

Congratulations to Barry Bridges on his selection for the Football League against the Scottish League next Wednesday. It is a choice that clearly puts him in the running for the England - Scotland match at Wembley on April 10, and we hope that on his first visit to Hampden Park Barry will touch the form that has made him our top scorer with 23 goals this season.

Youth Caps: Juniors Ray Willis (goalkeeper) and left-back Bobby Evans have been selected for further England honours in the Youth International against Wales at Newport on March 20.

In a recent programme we mentioned that John Mortimore played his 250th League game when we visited Blackburn on February 13. This figure did, in fact, include F.A. Cup appearances.



ABOUT OUR VISITORS

TONIGHT we welcome Tottenham Hotspur to Stamford Bridge for the second time in less than three weeks. The last occasion was a Fifth Round Cup-tie; now it is the League Championship fixture which was postponed last Saturday because of our participation in the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup.

In their one First Division match since they were here, Spurs drew 0-0 against one of our rivals for the Championship, Leeds United, and so retained the only

unbeaten home record in the First Division.

The performance was of particular merit because centre-forward Frank Saul injured a knee just before half-time and, after struggling on for a while, was off the field for the last half hour.

Manager Bill Nicholson made several changes for that match compared with the team beaten here in the Cup. England centre-half Maurice Norman was left out, Eddie Clayton switched from inside-left to left-half in place of Tony Marchi, and Alan Gilzean played at inside-left with Saul in the centre. Norman's omission meant the recall of former Arsenal half-back Laurie Brown.

Gilzean, Scotland's match-winner against England at Hampden Park last April, was Spurs' last big signing — at a £72,500 fee from Dundee in December.

Deadline Deals

Exactly a year ago, Spurs beat the annual March 16 transfer deadline to sign right-half Alan Mullery, from Fulham, and right-winger Jimmy Robertson, from St. Mirren. At £72,500 for Mullery and £25,000 for Robertson, their combined fees were all but £100,000, and in further big deals last summer Spurs signed right-back Cyril Knowles from Middlesbrough

and Northern Ireland goalkeeper Pat Jennings from Watford.

Jimmy Greaves, who left Chelsea for Milan in June 1961 and returned to English football with Spurs five months later, is far ahead as their top marksman again this season with 29 goals in League and Cup. He has scored in 21 matches — but in neither of the two against us.

Home and Away Contrast

When we visited White Hart Lane in October, we became the first visiting team to take a point there this season, and only Everton and Leeds have done so since.

Yet in away games, Spurs have had only one win all season (against Nottingham Forest at Christmas). On their First Division visits to London clubs, they have lost to West Ham (2-3), Fulham (1-4) and Arsenal (1-3).
