The Talk of Stamford Bridge

To find the last instance of League football being played at Stamford Bridge on a Saturday morning, we had to turn back the records to Christmas 1948. On that occasion, it was a Christmas day fixture against Portsmouth, with a crowd of 43,422 to see Tommy Walker make his farewell appearance for Chelsea. The match also marked the inauguration of the sixpenny magazine-style programme which we pioneered so successfully.

It was because of possible transport difficulties later in the day that we decided on an 11.30 kick-off today. The keenest of football followers will doubtless welcome the variation, enabling them, as it does, to see two matches in one day—Chelsea this morning and then, sustained by their turkey sandwiches and hip-flask, a visit to Arsenal, Brentford, Crystal Palace or

Leyton Orient this afternoon!

Our players spent last night at their London hotel HQ, and fly to Manchester tomorrow for Monday night's return match at Blackpool. They do not return home until Thursday (New Year's Eve), the opportunity being taken for three days' special training at Blackpool for the Cup and League tasks ahead.

Roger Wosahlo, 17-year-old apprentice forward, has signed as a full professional. A former England Schoolboy cap, he comes from Cambridge, and is leading scorer for our South-East Counties side.

Season-ticket holders are reminded that their tickets for the Third Round F.A. Cup-tie at home to Northampton Town will be posted to them next week. We have purposely held them back to avoid the Christmas postal rush. All seats for the match have now been sold.

YOU might think that players kissing at the scoring of a goal, spectators being "dressed down" for misconduct, referees lambasted by disgruntled (and usually beaten) clubs . . . and the sale of pirate programmes, are comparatively modern innovations in big Soccer. And you'd be hopelessly wrong—it was all happening to Chelsea nearly 60 years ago.

Turn up the club programme, the "Chelsea F.C. Chronicle", for 1906-07 (the second season of our existence) and you

find these examples:-

October 6: "What a lovely kiss Tommy McDermott gave Hilsdon when George scored that glorious goal on Saturday (the winner against Leicester Fosse)..."

FRONT COVER SHOT

I T'S one in a thousand! Barry Bridges scores his—and our—second goal against Wolves, the shot that enabled us to celebrate our 1,000th League game at Stamford Bridge with victory, put us back on top of the table and made us the first club in the First Division to reach 50 goals this season.

February 9: "Mr. Fred Kirkham ruled the game (the return against Leicester) with a rod of iron . . . and once stopped play to read the Riot Act to some of the Fosse supporters at the back of the Filbert Street goal."

March 7 (referring to the previous week's 1-2 defeat at Grimsby): "Defeat—when inflicted by the referee, and not the opposing team—is hard to bear. When Whiting put the ball into the net, he fully expected—as he afterwards admitted—to hear the whistle for offside. But Mr. Pearson pointed to the centre and was immediately surrounded by incredulous Chelsea players in excited protest. After a

QUESTION & ANSWER

Programme Editor Albert Sewell puts the questions to the young player who has progressed a very long way in the short time he has been with Chelsea:

GEORGE GRAHAM

FOUR months ago, you were Chelsea's "unknown" new boy, but now you are the Club's leading goalscorer. Have you always been a sharpshooter?

I wasn't much of a goalscorer until I came here. When I left Aston Villa, I didn't just change my club—my whole football outlook changed. In training, the Boss and coach Dave Sexton have kept impressing on me the need to become goalminded, and things have come off for me. But, frankly, I've surprised myself getting among the goals as much as this.

Can we go back to the start, for a brief outline of your life before you came into big football?

I was born at Bargeddie—that's just outside Glasgow—and grew up in the next village, Baillieston. I am the youngest of a family of five boys and two girls. Father died when I was only two weeks old and my mother had a very hard time bringing us all up. My football began in the Ayrshire & Coatbridge District schools team. Willie Henderson, of Rangers, was in the same forward line and we won the Scottish Schoolboy Cup. I went on to gain five Schoolboy caps in 1959-60. In two of those games (against England at Aberdeen and Wembley) I came up against Ronnie Harris; the other three were against Ireland, Wales and Germany, When I left school at 15½ a number of Scottish League clubs were after me . . . but so were Aston Villa and Newcastle. I went to see Villa Park for myself, and the fact that

there were several young Scots there made me decide to join them.

Then you went on to Youth International honours?

Yes, I played in all four games for Scotland in the 1963 International Youth Tournament — against Switzerland, Germany, Greece (that was a rough-house match at Tooting; we won 4-0, I got three goals and was knocked out by a Greek in the dressing-room afterwards), then in the semi-final at White City, where England beat us 1-0. The following November I was in the Rest of the U.K. team against England at Wembley, my fifth game for Scotland Youth.

Meanwhile, how were you progressing at Villa Park?

I was finding it frustrating. The longer I was there, the more Villa seemed a club with a past and, for me, no future. We young ones had to do a lot of the running for the older players, and fellows seemed to play more for themselves than for the team. That's how it looked to me, anyway. I had two League games for them in season 1962-63 (I got a goal on my debut against Liverpool) and six last season. The player who helped me most there was Phil Woosnam—he's terrific on tactics—but I wasn't sorry when Villa put me on the list at the end of last season.

And in June you came to Chelsea?

Yes, but it wasn't for the first time. They

were interested in me when I was getting near to leaving school, and Ted Drake (then Chelsea's manager) brought me down to spend a week here over Christmas and New Year. I can smile at it now, but I hated it then. I was just a kid bewildered by the size of London; I didn't know a soul, and was glad to get away out of it.

When Tommy Docherty signed you, did he give you any idea that a first-team place would be yours so soon?

His words were: "You're going to have to fight to get in, but if you do that you'll get your chance. Once you're in, it's up to you to take it." When I came, I knew it was a good side here, and quite expected I'd have to wait my time for a bit. It's the rest of the lads who have made me play better . . . yes, and the hard training. I'd never known anything so tough—the first two days it made me physically sick. But it's all been worthwhile.

What do you rate the best goal you have scored so far—would it be one of those in your hat-trick at Birmingham last month?


No, to me the best one was for Villa Reserves against Bury. It was an over-theshoulder shot right out of the blue. I've tried it a few times here, but it hasn't come off again. But it might . . .

What about your first game for Scotland's Under-23 side against Wales at Kilmarnock at the start of this month?

I never dreamt I would be picked so soon. We won 3-0, but I found it rather disappointing. I've played better and hope there will be further opportunities. I think the spectators expected me to get a hat-trick, but you can't turn it on and off like a tap.

April 6: "The 'programme pirates' are becoming more audacious than ever. On Good Friday they brought out a four-page 'edition' of exactly the same size as the 'Chelsea F.C. Chronicle', and printed in blue ink, too. The hawkers of these piratic productions wore blue and white armlets in order to carry their nefarious schemes to an artistic conclusion, but, of course, our regular followers know their C.F.C.C. too well to be easily taken in."

And all of 58 years ago we were appealing
—as we still do in 1964—to spectators to
"keep off the grass", as this extract shows
from our programme dated **September**29, 1906: "Visitors are earnestly requested
to refrain from running across the playing
pitch. The chief offenders are small and
thoughtless boys . . ."


DO YOU REMEMBER . . . ?

FOR the second successive Christmas we meet Blackpool twice and, naturally, we hope to repeat the "double" gained at their expense a year ago. In the intervening twelve months the Blackpool team has changed considerably, and this season there have been several departures, including centre-half Roy Gratrix to Manchester City, left-back Barrie Martin to Oldham Athletic, wing-half Billy Cranston to Preston and winger Stephen Hill to Tranmere Rovers.

Blackpool manager Ron Suart has progressively reduced the average age of the side over the past year or so, and most of the young players who have been introduced have fully justified his confidence.

Last line of defence is in the capable hands of England's goalkeeper Tony Waiters. A native of Southport, he has given Blackpool excellent service in recent seasons, and played his 150th League game in September.

Another player whose name is synonymous with consistency is right-back and skipper Jimmy Armfield. Capped by England in 41 full internationals, Manchester-born Armfield had figured in 326 League games at the beginning of this season.

Successor to Barrie Martin is Tommy Thompson, a north-easterner from Stockton-on-Tees, who, like Tony Waiters, is also a former England amateur international. He joined Blackpool from Stockton in 1961.

Graham Rowe is another Southport man making his name with Blackpool. Now in his second season as a professional, he had his first senior outing in February this year, and has played occasionally at centre-half.

The progress of centre-half Glyn James this season has been marked both by his first Welsh Under-23 cap and selection as reserve for the full Welsh side. Born at Llangollen, he signed professional in 1960, and made his League debut in October that year.

Johnny Green was transferred from Tranmere in March 1959. Green was then an inside-forward, and it was not until he was switched to the half-back line that he won a regular first-team place last winter.

A product of the club's ground staff is right-winger Leslie Lea, who slipped through the scouting net of the two League clubs in his native Manchester.

Red-haired Alan Ball has switched the opposite way to Lea, for he played his first League game at outside-right, in the opening fixture of the 1962-63 season. He gained a regular place last winter, and has since developed into a player of exceptional ability. A native of Farnworth (Lancashire) Ball won his first England Under-23 cap against Wales last month. He misses the Christmas matches because of a 14-day F.A. suspension which started on Monday.

Lancaster-born Ray Charnley joined Blackpool in 1957 from Morecambe, the Lancashire Combination club, and has been a consistent scorer ever since, topping the club's list of marksmen in five of the past six seasons.

John McPhee joined Blackpool from Motherwell in the summer of 1962, and has proved a clever utility player. He has occupied both wing-half positions, the two inside-forward berths, and has also played at centre-forward and outside right.

Left-winger Graham Oates was an amateur with Scunthorpe United before signing as a Blackpool professional in 1961.

Apart from Green, South African winger Desmond Horne is the only member of Blackpool's staff for whom a fee was paid to another Football League club. He had four years with Wolves before moving to Bloomfield Road in March 1961.

Commentaries on all first team matches are relayed to local hospitals by members of Chelsea TOC H.

HE'S IN CHARGE

MR. BRYAN SETCHELL, today's referee, comes from Luton and is a charge-hand with the British Aircraft Corporation.

Aged 38, he is in his second season as a Football League referee, having previously

officiated in the Southern League.

A former goalkeeper with Luton Amateurs, Mr. Setchell devotes much of his spare time to instructing referees, and is chairman of the Bedfordshire County Referees' Association.


