The Talk of Stamford Bridge

FROM F.A. Cup to League Champion-ship to Football League Cup, all in twelve days—how quickly the kaleidoscope changes! And changes faster still after tonight, with the First Division visit to Blackburn on Saturday, a "prestige" match against West Germany's World Cup side in Duisburg next Tuesday, followed by our "tie of ties" against Spurs in the F.A. Cup 6th Round on Saturday week, and on Monday, February 22 (providing neither club is involved in a replay) Nottingham Forest's appearance at Stamford Bridge in a League fixture re-arranged from Cup day.

Being in with prize-winning hopes in three major tournaments is a new and pleasant experience for us. Indeed, with so many major clubs side-stepping the Football League Cup, we are the first to establish such a live "treble chance" in home competition. In such circumstances the immediate game on hand is always the most important . . . and tonight that is the League Cup Semi-Final against Aston Villa.

In the first leg at Villa Park, we set up a 2-0 lead at half-time, but Villa fought back strongly and levelled at 2-2 before John Boyle came along with the shot—to mark indelibly his first-team debut—that puts us one up as we start the return leg. Villa have played in two out of four League Cup finals, but London has never been represented at the ultimate stage, and this we shall strive to remedy tonight. Extra time will be played if the teams are level on aggregate after 90 minutes, but, clearly one result we want to avoid—with such a busy fixture list ahead—is the necessity for a third match play-off.

Cup Tickets

We take this opportunity to repeat the announcement of arrangements for our all-ticket F.A. Cup 5th Round tie at home to Tottenham on February 20. All seats have been allocated, and Ground (5/-) and Enclosure (7/6) tickets will be sold here on Sunday from 10 a.m. at a maximum of two per person. No postal applications can be accepted.

Facts & Figures about this season's League Cup

THE Football League Cup has attracted, on average, one million spectators in each of the four seasons since its inauguration in 1960-61, and although the aggregate was below that figure last season at 945,265, the total for 1964-65 will closely approach, and possibly exceed, that number.

It stood at 863,102 before tonight's two Semi-final second legs and, with the addition of these and the home-and-away Final crowds, the overall attendance for the competition will again prove most worthwhile.

Lukewarm in London

Not that the League Cup arouses very great interest in London. Spurs and Arsenal have stayed out of the competition since its inception, and our own "home" gates this season have been disappointing: 6,596 v. Notts County (3rd Round), 5,979 v. Swansea Town (4th Round) and 7,936 v. Workington (5th Round replay).

Biggest attendance in the tournament this season: 27,433 for the 5th Round Midlands clash when Leicester City won

8-1 at Coventry.

Even that gigantic score was not the highest of the 1964-65 League Cup—in the 1st Round Workington beat Barrow 9-1. In the five-season history of the competition, there has been only one other ninegoal performance—Leyton Orient 9, Chester 2, in the 3rd Round of 1962-63.

SEAT RESERVATIONS

Prices of reserved seats at home League matches are 7/6, 10/-, 12/6 and 15/-. Applications (by post only) will be accepted one calendar month in advance, and should be accompanied by remittance and stamped addressed envelope.

It will be appreciated if separate application is made for each

match.

Seats may be purchased, if still available, by personal application at the club offices in the week preceding the match.

Aston Villa are bidding to reach the Final for the third time in five years. They beat Rotherham 3-2 on aggregate to become the first holders of the trophy (1960-61), and though beaten 3-1 on aggregate in the 1962-63 Final by Birmingham City still had a part in a League Cup record, for just under 70,000 saw the two-prong "local derby" Final—31,850 for the first leg at St. Andrews, and 37,921 for the second at Villa Park, which stands as the highest single-match attendance in League Cup history.





Our team was: Wood (Manchester United); Gunter (Portsmouth), Ellis (Charlton); Whitefoot (Manchester United), Dodgin (Arsenal), Edwards (Manchester United); Finney (Sheffield Wednesday), Broadbent (Wolves), Leary (Charlton), Nicholls (W.B.A.) and myself."

The record-book shows that five of those players gained full England caps: Edwards (18 times), Broadbent (7), Blunstone (5),

Wood (3) and Nicholls (2).

The Law says in full: "A player is offside if he is nearer his opponents' goal-line than the ball at the moment the ball is played, unless: (a) He is in his own half of the field of play, (b) There are two of his opponents nearer to their own goal-line than he is, (c) The ball last touched an opponent or was last played by him, (d) He received the ball direct from a goal-kick, corner-kick, throw-in or when it is dropped by the referee."
