



OUR VISITORS TODAY

WHEN Blackburn Rovers visited Stamford Bridge on December 27 last year they won 2-0, after we had defeated them 3-0 at Ewood Park two days earlier. While we are naturally hopeful that today's game with the Lancashire club will provide us with maximum points, there is no doubt that whatever reward is gained will come only after much effort, for the Rovers have been playing with marked consistency all season, and particularly in recent weeks.

Prior to last Saturday's home fixture with Manchester United they had recorded three successive victories, two of them away from home and had lost only

four of their 14 engagements.

Their record is even better than it looks for they have been most unfortunate with injuries of late. Both their regular full-backs, Ken Taylor and David Whelan, have been out of action, while England international right winger Bryan Douglas recently underwent a cartilage operation and Welsh international insideleft Roy Vernon has been in hospital for the removal of his appendix.

The Rovers are in a handy position from which to make a strong challenge for the First Division leadership in the coming weeks, and the way they are playing it is by no means improbable that they will have a say in the destination of the championship this term.

Whenever his regular first team players have not been available the Black-burn manager, Mr. Dally Duncan, has not hesitated to give youth its chance. For instance, 17-years-old Michael England was included at right-half recently when Ron Clayton was injured.

Others of the younger element who have done well in the senior side are right-back John Bray, who has exceeded even the most optimistic hopes as standin for Taylor; left-back Fred Pickering, and right winger Jack Airey. Pickering, who is only 18, had two outings in the rearguard last month before Whelan's return after injury, and had the satisfaction of finishing on the winning side each time. Airey, at present on National Service at nearby Preston, took over from Douglas for the visit to Leeds a fortnight ago and, like Pickering, helped his side to win.

Ronnie Clayton's inspiration has been of immense value to the team, though the success, as a whole, has been attributable to the efforts of every player called upon, young or experienced alike. Completing the middle line with Clayton are centre-half Matt Woods and Eire international Mick McGrath, while Harry Leyland has been very reliable in

goal.

Before last Saturday's game Blackburn had conceded only 20 goals in 14 engagements, and eleven of those had come in four matches. At the same time they had scored 27 themselves, a total which, while not particularly impressive, at least showed some consistency in the front line, which had failed to find the net in only one match.

Last season the attack was led chiefly by **Tom Johnston**, who returned to Leyton Orient in February. He was succeeded by giant **Derek Dougan**, whom the Rovers signed from Portsmouth the

following month.

Dougan did not quite live up to expectations last term, but this winter, following the removal of his tonsils during the close season, he has been playing extremely well and has regained his place in the Irish national side. He reckons the operation corrected former difficulty in breathing. He has taken some of the weight off the rest of the attack, which is not particularly well blessed physically, and while opposing defences have been keeping a wary eye on him, the other members of the line have benefited from the gaps left elsewhere.

The leading scorer, after the game at Leeds on October 24, was inside-right Peter Dobing with ten goals in 14 matches, exactly the same return as he had at a comparable stage last winter, at the end of which he had netted 24 times

in 40 outings.

Dougan and Vernon have also scored consistently, though there has been less penetration than usual on the extreme wings. Douglas scored only one goal, and that from a penalty, in his ten appearances before his injury, and Alastair MacLeod's return after 14 games had been played was only two goals.

A few weeks ago Douglas had two

A few weeks ago Douglas had two games at inside-left and another at inside-right. They were not really in the nature of experiments, for he was originally an inside-forward before settling down in the No. 7 berth and going on to reach England international rank there.

In addition to the youngsters already mentioned, others who have done well when brought into the senior side have been Roy Isherwood, who has done duty

This must stop, as we don't wish to be forced to follow the lead of other clubs who have discontinued reduced admission charges for youngsters.

THIS AND THAT

By TRUE BLUE

How Blackburn Rovers won the Cup Five times in Eight seasons

As football fans in general scarcely need to be reminded, Blackburn Rovers are among the oldest of the clubs. Also, as even a casual glance at any book which records these things plainly tells, they have a high place among the famous, with successes to their credit almost beyond dreams.

Before referring to them, let me insert a stray personal thought. One of the things which always intrigues—even fascinates—as I reflect on the experiences of these famous clubs is the number of links which connect old times with the present problems. The story of Blackburn Rovers contains several such links.

Take a simple but at the same time an important point by way of a start. In these days the managers of many clubs puzzle over the problem of how to get the players in their charge to reveal, consistently, their true form on the grounds of their opponents.

In the very early days of the Rovers this problem didn't arise, for one all-sufficient reason. They had a football club, but no ground of their own. For a couple of seasons or so all the matches were played on the grounds of their miscellaneous opponents. In those regular away games the club was strikingly successful.

They went right through one season without defeat. In due course they did get a ground of their own—a farm field was rented on the Preston New Road. It was nothing to boast about. Around the centre of the pitch was a deep cowpit which, instead of being filled in, was covered with wooden planks, which in turn were concealed with a precarious layer of sods. The stories about the happenings on that farmers field can be passed over, especially as I have a feeling that with the telling of them through the years the facts have got all mixed up with fiction.

A Cup Final Hat-trick

Strangely, in this district of Lancashire where professionalism was born and nurtured—despite the regulations against such—the Rovers officials were opposed to the idea as "being against the best interests of the game." The players were mostly local lads, but on their own grounds and elsewhere the Rovers built up a reputation for being among the best lot in the land, and in 1882 the day of days dawned. The Rovers went to the Cup Final.

In those times, and for a considerable period subsequently, there was a football custom which seems to have died a natural death—that of printing In Memoriam cards prior to a big do. This was the wording on the cards relating to the Rovers' first Cup Final:

All Hail yet gallant Rover lads! Etonians think you are but cads. They founds at football

fame their "dads",

In meeting Blackburn Rovers.

The sequel suggests that at least the printers of the cards, if not the Blackburn players themselves, were over-confident. On that historic occasion the Rovers were beaten by the Old Etonians.

In the following season another club with its home in the same town—Black-burn Olympic—took the Cup to this Lancashire football stronghold by beating the Old Etonians in the final tie. What happened to Blackburn Olympic afterwards doesn't matter much. What does matter is that forthwith the Rovers started on a hat-trick performance which has never been equalled—that of winning the F.A. Cup three times in succession.

On the first two occasions their opponents, Queen's Park, came all the way from Glasgow, but to complete their three wins in a row the Rovers had to meet West Bromwich Albion twice, winning the replay by two goals to nil.

A Goal-scorer's Secret

Three seasons went by, and again the Rovers came into the forefront of the picture as Cup-fighters, apparently not worrying unduly about the League, which had come into existence, and of which the Rovers, now installed at Ewood Park, were among the original twelve.

Sheffield Wednesday were beaten by six goals to one in the 1890 final, and Notts County by three to one in the following Only one club-Bury-has equalled the Rovers' half dozen in a final tie, and a lot of water flowed under Putney Bridge before Stan Mortensen equalled the William Townley hat-trick

feat against the Wednesday.

Quite naturally, after his success, this Blackburn forward was asked about the secret of goalscoring. He summed the whole thing up in a very few words. "It's dead easy," he said. "I shoot to hit the goal-minder, and I nearly always miss him!" Is there a hint in that bit of advice for the current forwards who so often miss the target completely because they try to place the ball out of the reach of the goal-minder, as he was called in the olden days?

The Rovers were not among those who are so ready to blame an enforced change of attire for a defeat. On the journey to their sixth final at Kennington Oval the skip containing the clothing of the players went astray. As desperate efforts to buy or hire a complete set of shirts proved unsuccessful, some of the men were duly dolled up in what are called dress-shirts —that is with starched fronts and cuffs. But what matter? They beat Notts County "comfortably" as one player quite incorrectly described it.

Not So Good Days

Now there comes the contrast part of the Rovers story. The Blackburn people who had gone well-nigh mad over Cup triumphs had to wait more than twenty years for something to shout about in respect of League returns. Eventually, however, a team was built up which did

win the championship.

In 1912, and again two years later, Blackburn finished on top of the table. The big personality of a fine side was Bob Crompton, an automatic choice for England at right-back for a dozen years. Immediately after the club's second championship success came a sad day for Crompton. In the first round of the Cup competition their opponents were Swansea Town, then in the Second Division of the old Southern League.

"Don't worry" said Billy Bradshaw after he had failed with a penalty kick, "we shall win by eight!" The Rovers lost by one goal, and bang went the last chance of Crompton of adding a Cup medal to his trophies. So far as there can be adequate compensation, Crompton had it in 1928, when he was manager of the Rovers team which again won the Cup.

Until eight years later the Rovers shared with Aston Villa the distinction of having played in the First Division from the commencement. Along with the Villa the Rovers were relegated. They soon came back-champions of the second class, only to drop again after the second

The wonder finish of 1958, which ended in a dramatic last match victory at Charlton, is well remembered. And now they come to the Bridge again with a side which includes a player who may equal the record of Crompton-Ronnie Clayton, England's new captain.
