The Talk of Stamford Bridge

ONE of the everlasting fascinations of the F.A. Cup is that it brings together clubs from all walks of football life, such as today's visit of Bolton Wanderers, whom we are delighted to welcome again to Stamford Bridge. Considering they are among our oldest opponentsthey first came to Chelsea in the League on October 12, 1907—it is remarkable that we have never previously met here in the F.A. Cup. But, of course, Bolton have already crossed our Wembley path once this season. In the fourth round of the League Cup they jolted us by playing a 1-1 draw in October. Everything went right for us in the replay, but today is another day . . . Bolton will believe that what they have achieved once here this season they can do again . . . and even when we have been beaten only once in 22 matches, this is no time for anyone in our camp to feel the slightest bit complacent. Not, we fancy, that anyone does, but the reminder can do no harm.

Four-day break: After next Saturday's match at Southampton, the first-team squad are off to Tenerife, in the Canary Islands, for a sunshine-and-golf holiday until the following Thursday. They've had a lot of football already—today's is our 41st competitive match of the season—and, with plenty more to come, the players have earned a break, which should serve as a good build-up for the League Cup Final two weeks later.

Replay arrangements: If today's match is drawn, the replay will be at Bolton on Wednesday (7.30 p.m.). We shall have an allocation of reserved seats, and these will be sold after today's game to Seasonticket holders only on a first come, first served basis. Any unsold will be put on sale to the general public during normal Ticket Office hours on Monday.

the ball he put through for our fourth goal against Everton and, of course, his usual polished all-round performance. John's 400 Chelsea matches comprise 303 in the League, 42 F.A. Cup, 30 League Cup, 15 Fairs Cup, nine Cup-Winners' Cup and one F.A. Charity Shield. His goal-total is 43—14 of them this season, easily the best scoring season of his career.

Tuesday's match: Unless we are involved in a replay at Bolton the following night, we shall be visiting The Valley on Tuesday to provide the opposition in the Testimonial match for Charlton's long-serving player Keith Peacock. Kick-off 7.30 p.m.

Injury news: John Dempsey, who twisted an ankle in the second half against Everton, had the foot put in plaster on Monday in the hope that three days' complete rest would clear up the injury in

time to play today. John Hollins, Paddy Mulligan and Chris Garland have all been under treatment for knocks received last Saturday. Ian Hutchinson, still in hospital, is making satisfactory progress after having the plate removed from his injured left leg.

Well done, George's men! David Webb paid a nice compliment to George Anstiss, Stamford Bridge ground overseer, and his men after last week's game. Interviewed on Radio London's football programme Extra Time (on the air every Saturday at 6 p.m. on VHF 95.3), Dave said how well the pitch had played after so much rain during the week and went on: "Our pitch is fantastic, and the ground-staff at Chelsea are the best in the land. They're so conscientious—we've only just finished the game and they're already out there putting it together again for next week." And what Dave said goes for us all.

RONNIE CORBETT

R ONNIE CORBETT regrets that he's unable to make the League Cup Final ... and says he'll save his Chelsea cheers for the F.A. Cup Final instead! The reason we don't see him here today, or until almost the end of the season, is his own pantomime season at the Palladium. As Buttons, he tops the bill—it's his fourth time in "Cinderella" following previous years in Edinburgh, Glasgow and Birmingham—and the show runs until mid-April.

Immaculate in turquoise dressing-gown and the best-known horn-rims in the Entertainment business, Ronnie stretched his dapper figure on the settee in the theatre dressing-room, lit a cigar and talked of football and his career . . . in that order.

"Being born in Edinburgh, I followed Hearts as a lad. A cousin, Jimmy Murray, played for them and I was brought up on the skills of Tommy Walker (when he came back to Tynecastle from Chelsea), Alfie Conn, Jimmy Wardhaugh, Willie Bauld and, later, Dave Mackay.

"When I left the R.A.F., I came to London in search of a stage career. In the early days I filled in a lot of the time working in bars and cafes. Then the club and cabaret bookings began to get more frequent and the bartending less.

"The big break came about five years ago, when David Frost offered me a job on his BBC show, 'The Frost Report'. He'd seen me working in night clubs like



Winstons and Danny La Rue's. Everything's happened for me from there . . . yes, I owe a lot to David Frost.

"I started coming to Chelsea while Tommy Docherty was manager—I'd known him from his playing days. Then Dave Sexton took over, and he made me welcome, too. But I must admit Chelsea and Hearts are not my only football loves. Crystal Palace are the club nearest my home, and I like to go there, too, a few times each season."

As a Scot, Ronnie picks Charlie Cooke, not surprisingly, among his favourite Chelsea players, closely followed by Peter Houseman and Peter Osgood. "The team has certainly struck a purple patch again now, and it's remarkable that after all those years without a cup, Chelsea have won two in the last two seasons and are at Wembley again. What an achievement by Dave Sexton!"

Every day between matinee and evening performances at the Palladium, Ronnie Corbett takes a nap. He's not dreaming when he says he fancies Chelsea might be the first club to reach two Wembley Finals in one season. We'll drink to that . . . and share with him the hope that his "other" team, Crystal Palace, hold their place in the First Division.


... But it ended in the safe hands of Peter Bonetti (left). Skipper Ron Harris guards the near post with an expression that says "everything's under control," And it was.



STRANGE things sometimes happen on the fixture list when Cup draws are made. Take today's tie. Since Bolton Wanderers dropped from the First Division in 1964, Chelsea have lost the habit of playing them for points, yet this afternoon the teams meet for the third time in four months in the knock-out business. In the fourth round of the League Cup back in October, Bolton achieved a 1-1 draw here, but in the replay at Burnden Park Chelsea put things right by six clear goals, three of them from Tommy Baldwin.

The only other occasion when the clubs have clashed in the Cup was more than half a century ago, in the old first round (equal to the present-day third round) in season 1919-20, when Chelsea won by the only goal at Bolton. So, as far as Cup football goes, the Blues have a 100 per cent success record to maintain against the Trotters. There has been many a milestone meeting between them in the League since Bolton first trotted out at Stamford Bridge in season 1907-8. Did you know, for instance, that on August 31, 1946—the day League football was resumed after the last war—Chelsea kicked off with a full house here and a 4-3 win against . . . Bolton Wanderers?

For the most dramatic Chelsea-Bolton match, you needed to be here on the last day of season 1950-51. So far as Chelsea are concerned, that Saturday afternoon of May 5 was the daddy of all relegation dramas. Sheffield Wednesday and Everton were the others involved, and the three clubs knew that, come the final whistle, two of them must fall through the trapdoor into the Second Division. By the greatest of good fortune for Chelsea, the Wednesday and Everton clashed at Hillsborough while the Blues were at home to Bolton, who stood seventh in the table.

All three relegation-threatened sides kicked off with a chance of escape. Everton needed a draw at Sheffield to be safe; Wednesday could stay up if they beat Everton and Chelsea lost to Bolton; Chelsea's survival depended on victory over Bolton coupled with a win for Wednesday. Alfred Hitchcock could not have improved on it as a suspense-thriller, and as a memory-jogger for both sets of fans here today, this was how the teams lined up at Stamford Bridge: Chelsea—Robertson; Bathgate, Tickridge, Dickson, Saunders, Mitchell, Campbell, Bentley, Smith, Armstrong, Gray. Bolton—Hanson; Ball, Howe, Wheeler, Barrass, Edwards, Codd, Corfield, Lofthouse, Moir, Langton.

In those days, Chelsea fans got their kicks out of relegation escapes, not, as now, from the winning of cups. They certainly had their moneysworth that afternoon. With two spring-heeled leaps, Roy Bentley headed two past Stan Hanson in 19 minutes, and Bobby Smith made it 4-0 with goals just before and after half-time which even Bolton's 'keeper applauded as he picked the ball out of the net.

With 15 minutes to go, the result from Sheffield came through (they had kicked off earlier than Chelsea), and the statisticians in the crowd got busy working out whether Wednesday's 6-0 win was better than Chelsea's 4-0 in the final assessment of goal averages. It wasn't . . . and when the whistle went you would have thought Chelsea had won the Championship. All three clubs had finished with 32 points, but Chelsea were safe—by one twenty-fifth of a goal! And as the team filed off a field swarming with delirious supporters, the stands shook with the applause of a near-40,000 crowd. Come to think of it, perhaps all the excitement that day was the start of the North Stand getting a touch of the tremors that finally closed it this season!

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

FOCUS VISITORS

S first Wembley winners of the F.A. A Cup when the Final moved there from Stamford Bridge in 1923, Bolton Wanderers made an indelible mark on the competition. Indeed, with further triumphs in 1926 and 1929, they won three of the first seven Wembley Finals, and in 1958 the trophy went to Burnden Park for the fourth timea total that places Bolton joint fourth in the list of Cup-winning clubs.

Falling into the Third Division last April meant starting this season's Cup fixtures in the first round proper. In that opening round Bolton beat Bangor 3-0 at home; then came another win against non-League opposition, 4-1 away to Rossendale; and in round three Roger Hunt scored the goal that gave

them a 2-1 victory at home to Torquay.

If manager Jimmy Armfield keeps to the side that beat Plymouth last Saturday, today's line-up will include three 18-year-olds in defenders Don McAllister and Paul Jones, and forward Stuart Lec. But John Byrom, the club's second highest scorer

this season, may be back after influenza.

Two full-backs are currently ruled out-John Ritson, who is under F.A. suspension, and 24-yearold Paul Hallows, scriously hurt at York on New Year's Day. Fortunately the injury was not a fractured skull as was first feared. We are pleased to hear that Paul is gradually improving and that he has left hospital and gone home to Chester to continue his recovery.

CHARLIE WRIGHT: Joined Bolton on a free transfer from Charlton last June and, we remember, played magnificently in goal here in the League Cup in October. A qualified F.A. coach, he has been with Glasgow Rangers, Workington and Grimsby. Born Glasgow. 6 ft., 12 st. 12 lb. DON McALLISTER: Established himself in the

first-team at left-back last season when only 17 years old. Joined Wanderers from school and skippered the youth team last term. Born Radcliffe, 5 ft. 10 in.,

Today's subject in our special series of interviews is



CHARLIE COOKE

Reflecting on my six years with Chelsea:	Most of the same faces are here as when I came down from Dundee in April 1966. We are all six years older and that much more mature, and having a basic "sameness" about the side—allowing it to settle into something—has paid big dividends.
Prospects of Chelsea getting to Wembley twice in one year:	I think it is very much "on". We have proved ourselves a good Cup side we're there already in the League Cup and in the mood that has built up over the past three months we really do fancy our chance of winning four more F.A. Cup-ties to become the first club to play two Wembley Finals in the same season. It's bound to be done by someone. Why not us this year?
Why has today's Chelsea become a "Cup team" and not yet a Championship side?	Championships usually begin at the beginning—and we haven't made a habit of starting the season well. It's hard to pin-point a reason, but it seems to happen to us most years, and I'm inclined to put it down to a lack of concentration after the summer break.
Favourite position:	Midfield or up front, I don't mind. The way the squad has developed here, you realise it's something to get a game anywhere in the side.
Most respected opponent:	George Best. Even though things weren't going well for United when we beat them two weeks ago, you had to stand back and applaud the things he can do.
Business interests outside football:	For about a year now I've been in partnership with John Franks in a home-decorating and hardware shop called "Chelsca Decor" in Burlington Road, New Malden. It's going quite well, and I'm there as many afternoons as I can fit in with training and travelling.
Best game of career so far:	I can't usually get to agree with what people say about how I've played, but the experts seemed to reckon I was at my best in those two matches against Real Madrid in Athens last May, and I think I'll stand by that.
Biggest thrill:	Being in a successful Chelsea team. The clubs I was with in Scotland —Aberdeen and Dundee—didn't get to Finals; down here, without wanting to sound flash about it, winning things has become a habit.
Future hopes:	To carry on playing longer than people expect, now that that magic mark of 30 is getting nearer.
Thoughts on the League Cup Final:	It has the makings of a marvellous match, when you remember our two tremendous semi-finals with Spurs and Stoke's four stirring tussles with West Ham. We have a healthy respect for Stoke. Yes, it'll be some game!
