

The Talk of Stamford Bridge

WE end 1972 as we began it by playing Derby County, and welcome them here today as they welcomed us to the Baseball Ground last New Year's Day. Between times, back in October, we also met them home and away in the Football League Cup . . . and we would like to think we are about to find our touch again now in readiness for Wednesday night's return journey to Norwich in the League Cup semi-final second leg. Fate certainly lent us a hand when we were there ten days ago and losing 5-2 on the two-leg aggregate with only six minutes left. The fog did not, of course, blot out the two goals which Norwich scored here in the first leg, and we have still to make those good before anything "starts to count", but we are grateful for the reprieve and for the totally unexpected chance to survive a tie that had all but slipped beyond us.

* * *

Decrease, not decline: Amid the general trend of falling attendances this season, we feel our own circumstances are somewhat different from most in view of the major rebuilding operations now in progress at Stamford Bridge. Last Saturday's crowd of 23,385 against Everton was our lowest League gate of the season predictably so immediately before Christmas—and our average after 11 First Division home matches now stands at 33,131. This compares with 41,791 at the same stage last season, and after 11 home games there is an aggregate drop of 95,000. Yet this figure needs to be kept in proportion and measured against our Stadium redevelopment programme. The loss of seats and standing in the demolished East Stand is 7,826; furthermore, as a result of the transfer of Season-ticket holders, there are now 2,993 fewer seats available for sale in the West Stand, making a total loss of 10,819 per game. Therefore the loss over the 11 matches already played is (11 by 10,819) 119,009, which exceeds the actual attendance fall (95,000). Also, of course, we still have to play at home to Derby, Arsenal, Wolves, Tottenham and Manchester United—five attractive matches that had




The Chairman's New Year Greeting

On behalf of my fellow Directors, the Management, Players and Staff, I thank you for your continued support and extend very best wishes to you for the New Year, coupled with the hope that it will be one of further progress for our Club.

WHAT managers say to players at half-time is not for public ears, but if Chelsea fans still cannot hear what Dave Sexton tells the team, they have at least been able to see what's going on since the policy of staying in the arena during the interval was adopted in home matches last month. So far we've been able to wear a winning smile at half-time only once since we stayed on-field for the break—that was first time out in the League Cup-tie against Notts County. A change today?

Talk of Stamford Bridge—continued already been staged this time last season. Clearly, as far as Chelsea Football Club is concerned the decrease (not decline) in gates is not only accountable through the rebuilding, but if there had been a stand on the East side it is possible that our attendances would have increased.

Norwich City v. Chelsea

Wednesday next, Jan. 3 (7.30 p.m.)

THE match is NOT all-ticket this time. As we announced in the National Press and London Evenings on Thursday, our allocation of reserved seats was being put on sale here today—to Season-ticket holders only—from 12 noon at the Ticket Office adjacent to the West Stand turnstiles. Voucher No. 32 from Season-ticket book must be produced. Any seats remaining unsold today will be put on general sale here on Monday from 9.30 a.m.

The Chelsea Train will again run to Norwich on Wednesday. Second-class return £2.15; first-class (includes high tea outward and dinner on return journey) £7. Train times (still to be confirmed at time of going to press); Outward, depart Liverpool St. approx. 15.50; return, depart Norwich approx. 22.35, arrive Liverpool St. approx. 00.54. Rail tickets are available ONLY from Chelsea F.C. and can be obtained from the Main Office after today's match or during normal hours next Monday and Tuesday.

PAGE FROM THE PAST: SEASON 1960-61

THE Chelsea story of twelve years ago revolved round one individual to an astonishing degree. Jimmy Greaves had burst on the soccer scene as an infant prodigy. His scoring feats as a junior became legendary, and in his four-season spell in the first team he scored 124 goals in 157 League games out of the 334 Chelsea totalled in that period. Year by year his hauls were 22, 32, 29 and 41.

Then, on April 29, 1961, he played his last game in the blue shirt of Chelsea before moving into Italian football with A.C. Milan, lured there by a salary then unmatchable in Britain. Typically, in his last match for us, against Nottingham Forest at Stamford Bridge, he scored all four goals (one from the penalty spot) in

a 4-3 victory.

A contemporary newspaper report described the scene at the end: "As a thousand fans hugged, slapped, and carried their Milan-bound hero to the tunnel in a wave of emotion, players of both sides formed an avenue and clapped him off. Before he disappeared little Jimmy broke down and cried."

Will Greaves's 41 goals that season—five of them in the 7-1 victory over West Bromwich which equalled our biggest First Division win—ever be beaten as the individual Chelsea scoring record? His hat-trick in the 6-3 home win against Manchester City in November made him the first player ever to reach a century of League goals before the age of 21.

A bleak last week of 1960 saw Manchester United and Wolves each taking six goals off Chelsea. As if this was not humiliation enough, one of the darkest days in Chelsea history immediately followed as we made our F.A. Cup exit in the third round by 2-1 against Fourth Division Crewe

Alexandra at Stamford Bridge.

From such depths it was perhaps surprising that ultimately a position of twelfth was reached. Occasionally the team's performances suggested vastly better prospects. Newcastle United were thrashed 6-1 in March in front of their own supporters (that still equals our best away win in the First Division) thanks to another Greaves "foursome"; Cardiff City were sent home seven days later, beaten by a similar score. Life was certainly never dull, and for those who like to see the net bulging, the Chelsea records for goals for (98) and against (100) were both broken that season.


The Juniors added to their high reputation by taking the F.A. Youth Cup for the second successive season—Everton being beaten by a 5-3 aggregate in the Final and winning the South-East Counties

League yet again.

Changes behind the scenes included the retirement of Jack Oxberry from the post of first-team trainer after eight years. He was, of course, succeeded by Harry Medhurst. But of perhaps greatest significance was the appointment in February of Arsenal and Scotland half-back Tommy Docherty as coach. Welcoming him in the Club Programme, Manager Ted Drake wrote: "His dynamic and cheerful personality is already making itself felt." With the arrival of "Doc", one of the most spectacular phases in Chelsea history had begun.

Personal applicants can buy a 50p or 40p ticket, but Season-ticket holders making postal applications are restricted to a 40p ticket. These applications must be received by January 3, accompanied by Voucher No. 33, correct

remittance and stamped, addressed return envelope.

BETWEEN OURSELVES

A T this time of year more than any other we look forward, we look back. And in the looking back, it's good to think of the friends we've made, or met again, through football during the past year. Which is why I want to tell you about Rold, a Norwegian seaman who spent the two October Saturdays of his precious ten days' leave in London watching Spurs play Stoke and then Chelsea against West Bromwich Albion. For outside his family and the call of the sea, football is the great love of his life. British football. He's first officer aboard an 80,000-ton Norwegian tanker, and on the long voyages that take him across the world, to Japan and Trinidad, Australia and the Middle East, he spends most of his off-duty time studying, reading and researching British football.

At home in Norway he has a wife and three grown-up daughters. It's a family joke that when he telephoned all the way from the Persian Gulf to congratulate one of his daughters on her confirmation, his mind strayed somewhat from the subject while the call was being put through. When he was eventually connected, his first words were to ask how the local football team in Bergen were doing.

But football here is Rold's big sporting interest, and has been since, on various war-time ports of call (he was already on tankers then) he put in at places like Liverpool, Cardiff and Portsmouth. "This is the *real* football," he says. "In Norway we only play at it, while here it is a way of life. Perhaps by the time I retire from tankers I shall have won the Pools (he sends them in regularly on our matches). Then I will come and live here and start catching up on all the football I have missed through being so long at sea."

I met Rold at a house-party, and within minutes of our introduction he was revealing his encyclopaedic soccer knowledge by reciting the names of the original twelve clubs who formed the Football League . . . talking of Tottenham and Arsenal as the only teams to do the "double" this century . . . of his fascination for Everton and Sunderland and the high place they hold in the charts he keeps of long-serving First Division clubs. He talked of Tom Finney and Bobby Charlton . . . compared past and present Chelsea centre-forwards Tommy Lawton and Peter Osgood.

He had just one piece of shopping to do before he went back to sea three days later—
a copy of the latest Rothmans Football Book "which will take up all my reading time
aboard ship these next six months. I have the first two and must get the latest one." I
slipped home for the spare copy I had, and presented it to him together with the new
Observer Book of Football. I've never seen a grown-up so excited about a present (well,
it isn't every day one is kissed on both cheeks by a Norwegian seaman!). He said it was
like Christmas come two months early.

Now Christmas is past, the New Year is only hours away. I met Rold for no more than four hours that October night, and we may never meet again, yet I shall always count him among my friends, because he's a true friend of football. And as we cross the line into 1973 tomorrow night, I'll raise a glass to him, wherever he and his tanker may be on the oceans of the world.

Sail on, my friend; may the waves rise with you. And as you tune the ship's radio to BBC short-wave in search of the football results this evening and every Saturday night in the New Year, may you receive them loud and clear . . . with many a fine-sounding Chelsea score among them.

Meet the fan with a record none can beat and few (how few, we wonder?) can equal:

HE'S BEEN WATCHING CHELSEA EVER SINCE WE BEGAN!

HOW many people here today saw Chelsea's first home match on September 11, 1905? How many, we wonder, in addition to 80-year-old Ted Rice, a West Stand season-ticket holder? Mr. Rice, who has supported us for 67 years, vividly recalls standing on the terracing as a 13-year-old for that historic opening Second Division match against Hull City which Chelsea won 5-1. He recites the side who played as if it were yesterday.

Says Mr. Rice: "I paid 6d. to get in. There was no pushing or jostling at the turnstiles then. Crowds everywhere were well-behaved. They sang and chanted, but

there was no violence.

"I have so many happy recollections of Chelsea, have seen so many memorable games—for instance, that unforgettable match against Moscow Dynamo in 1945 when the biggest crowd ever seen at Stamford Bridge crammed into every corner of the ground. They were on the hoardings, over the greyhound track, on top of the stands, everywhere. Someone even fell through the roof into the stand below."

Another match which Mr. Rice has good reason to remember was an F.A. Cup encounter against Swindon in 1911. "That was the most gripping match I ever saw. Chelsea won 3-1 and it was so thrilling that I collapsed with excitement and had to be carried to a canteen, where I was revived with a cup of hot tea.

"Just behind that for tension was the

game with Sheffield Wednesday which Chelsea had to win to become League Champions for the first time in 1955. We won 3-0 while Portsmouth, who were also in the running, drew at Cardiff. Amid tremendous after-match scenes Ted Drake, the manager, and captain Roy Bentley addressed the cheering crowd over the loudspeakers."

Of all the distinguished players who have served Chelsea, Mr. Rice picks out Jimmy Windridge, George Hilsdon, Andy Wilson and Hughie Gallacher as his favourites. But he says: "Many of today's stars would have been just as popular in those days. The club has never had a better goalkeeper than Peter Bonetti, and Ron Harris is one of the most consistent and dependable men

ever to wear the Chelsea shirt."

Mr. Rice has not only given Chelsea tremendous support. In his position, before retirement, at the Ministry of Labour, he was able to assist us on several

occasions just after the last war.

He remembers: "Bobby Smith had to register for National Service one Saturday and manager Billy Birrell, whom I got to know very well, feared that Bobby would miss the match in the afternoon. Fortunately, I was able to speed things through in the morning and he scored a hat-trick in the afternoon.

"Another time Billy Birrell invited me to spend several days at Chelsea when he was organising a youth policy. I sorted out applications from all over the country and helped arrange the first trials. That was

Mr. Rice, still a regular at home matches, lives in Borneo Street, Putney, and is driven to the ground by friends. He remains as enthusiastic as ever. "If someone really supports a team their interest never wanes. At one time I used to travel from Stoke to Stamford Bridge for every home game, see only the second-half and then return. Having supported Chelsea most of my life, I do not intend to stop now."

We thank Mr. Rice for his wonderful support since the very beginning of Chelsea Football Club and wish him many more seasons as a Stamford Bridge spectator. And we would like to hear from any other present-day supporters who, like Ted Rice, saw the first match played here way back in September 1905.



DERBY COUNTY'S 3-1 win at home to Manchester United on Boxing Day—captain and centre-half Roy McFarland scored two of the goals—lifted them above us to seventh place in the table. They have earned 20 of their 26 points at the Baseball Ground and will obviously be hoping to produce some of their formidable home form here today.

Remembering how boldly they played when they visited Stamford Bridge in a League Cup replay in October, it is hard to understand why County have scored only seven away League goals all season—the fewest in the First Division except for Coventry City's six.


