

THE TALK OF STAMFORD BRIDGE

WITH opponents Leeds United heading the table, we should have our best home attendance this afternoon since 34,067 saw us play Burnley on the season's opening day, and after two successive home defeats—without a Chelsea goal to cheer in either—we urgently need a "best performance" to match. The four points dropped in those fixtures prevent us being at the top with Leeds, but fortunately we continue to bring home the spoils from other grounds, and last Saturday's victory over Sheffield United made us the first club to score five away League wins this season.

New Stand: Today, our new West Stand comes into use—partial use, that is —for the first time, with approximately 1,500 of the total 6,000 seats installed. You can see what good progress is being made between each match, and more 10—seats, as well as those at 15—in the centre, will be on sale as they become available. Meanwhile, we hope patrons will appreciate that the approaches to the West Stand are, of necessity, in a far from finished condition, and until completion we advise that extra care should be taken approaching and leaving that side of the ground.

Wiener Arrangements: Supporters' Club secretary Mick Mears is organising an air charter in connection with our Inter-Cities Fairs Cup second round (first leg) tie in Vienna on Wednesday week, November 17. Details are available after today's match at the Development Association Office (in the main office block) or by telephone from Mr. Mears at Howard 6901 (evenings only).

The second leg will be played at Stamford Bridge on Tuesday, November 30, and ordinary League prices will be charged, with Stand tickets as follows: Blocks A & H & North Stand 7/6, B & G 10-, C & F 12/6, D & E 15-. Seasonticket holders are reminded that their tickets are not valid, and that they have until Saturday next in which to reserve their own seats. They should apply by post, quoting seat numbers and enclosing remittance and addressed envelope for return.

Absentees: Ron Harris, out since the Blackpool game with a ham-string injury, faces three more weeks on the sidelines after a breakdown in training on Monday. Meanwhile, he is spending a few days with brother Alan at Coventry. Eddie Mc-

Creadie, who began 14 days' suspension on Monday—a sequel to the Roma match here—will be available for our Inter-Cities Fairs Cup tie against Wiener S.C. in Vienna.

Bobby's Comeback: After his lay-off through injury, Bobby Tambling returned to action last Saturday and scored the goal in our 1-0 Football Combination win at home to West Ham. He will be glad of a quick goal on his return to First Division football, having waited on the 99 League goals mark since August 25.

Congratulations . . . to John Hollins on his selection for the England Under-23 side against France at Norwich on Wednesday. It was his fourth Under-23 appearance. Terry Venables was also selected but had to withdraw because of the ankle injury which caused him to leave the field at Sheffield last Saturday.

Signed: Alan Nelmes, a 17-year-old full-back from Thornton Heath, has signed as a professional. He was previously with Crystal Palace and, on being released by them at the end of last season, joined our Juniors during the summer.

Transferred: Inside-forward Jim Mc-Calliog was transferred to Sheffield Wednesday last Friday, and at the same time we released his younger brother Frank from an apprentice contract. We wish them well at Hillsborough.



GARETH SPRAKE, goalkeeper of Championship leaders Leeds United, has come a long way since being introduced to first-team football when only 16 in March 1962. He has made a name as one of the best young goalkeepers in the country, and looks certain to be a regular choice for Wales (seven caps) as well as for his club for a long time to come.

Right-back **Paul Reancy**, though born in London, has played all his football with Leeds, and is another of their younger players with a bright future. He is an England Under-23 cap.

Willie Bell recently returned at left-back after missing nine games through a knee injury. He joined Leeds from Queen's Park, with whom he won Scottish amateur honours.

Another Scot, **Billy Bremner**, was originally a forward. It is as an attacking right-half, however, that he has really made his name, following appearances for Scotland Under-23's with full international honours.

Jack Charlton, who comes from Ashington, Northumberland, won the first of his seven full England caps against Scotland in April. At the start of this season, his 13th with Leeds, he had played 354 League games.

Left-half **Norman Hunter** has gained England Under-23 and Football League recognition, which could well be the forerunners of full international honours. He comes from Middlesbrough, and joined the Leeds staff in 1962.

Signed from Airdriconians in 1962, Jim Storrie has played in every forward position except inside-left, and has been a consistent marksman. He did not appear

this season until last month, when he was recalled following the serious injury to Bobby Collins.

Peter Lorimer, former Scottish schoolboy international from Dundee, made his debut for Leeds at the age of 15 in September 1962, being the youngest player ever to appear in their first team.

England centre-forward Alan Peacock came into prominence with his home-town club, Middlesbrough, and was transferred to Leeds in February 1964. He unluckily missed most of last winter with a knee injury.

The switch of **John Giles** from outsideright to inside-left is not surprising, for he began his career as an inside-forward. He gained Eire honours while with Manchester United, with whom he spent five years before joining Leeds in August 1963.

Latest addition to the Leeds playing strength is England left-winger **Mike O'Grady**, signed from Huddersfield on October 15. In making this move he joined his home-town club after six years with Huddersfield.

THEIR MANAGER

BEFORE transfer fees soared to their present level, more money changed hands over Don Revie than any other player. Starting his career with Leicester City (whom he helped to reach the F.A. Cup Final in 1949, though missing Wembley through injury), he later played for Hull City, Manchester City-where he had a tactical forward plan named after him -Sunderland and Leeds. He signed for Leeds in 1958 and was appointed player-manager in March 1961, on the resignation of Mr. Jack Taylor. He gave up playing 12 months later. Last weekend Don Revie underwent an appendicitis operation, and we wish him a speedy return to fitness and football.
