

GARETH SPRAKE, goalkeeper of Championship leaders Leeds United, has come a long way since being introduced to first-team football when only 16 in March 1962. He has made a name as one of the best young goalkeepers in the country, and looks certain to be a regular choice for Wales (seven caps) as well as for his club for a long time to come.

Right-back **Paul Reaney**, though born in London, has played all his football with Leeds, and is another of their younger players with a bright future. He is an England Under-23 cap.

Willie Bell recently returned at left-back after missing nine games through a knee injury. He joined Leeds from Queen's Park, with whom he won Scottish amateur honours.

Another Scot, **Billy Bremner**, was originally a forward. It is as an attacking right-half, however, that he has really made his name, following appearances for Scotland Under-23's with full international honours.

Jack Charlton, who comes from Ashington, Northumberland, won the first of his seven full England caps against Scotland in April. At the start of this season, his 13th with Leeds, he had played 354 League games.

Left-half **Norman Hunter** has gained England Under-23 and Football League recognition, which could well be the forerunners of full international honours. He comes from Middlesbrough, and joined the Leeds staff in 1962.

Signed from Airdriconians in 1962, Jim Storrie has played in every forward position except inside-left, and has been a consistent marksman. He did not appear

this season until last month, when he was recalled following the serious injury to Bobby Collins.

Peter Lorimer, former Scottish schoolboy international from Dundee, made his debut for Leeds at the age of 15 in September 1962, being the youngest player ever to appear in their first team.

England centre-forward Alan Peacock came into prominence with his home-town club, Middlesbrough, and was transferred to Leeds in February 1964. He unluckily missed most of last winter with a knee injury.

The switch of **John Giles** from outsideright to inside-left is not surprising, for he began his career as an inside-forward. He gained Eire honours while with Manchester United, with whom he spent five years before joining Leeds in August 1963.

Latest addition to the Leeds playing strength is England left-winger **Mike O'Grady**, signed from Huddersfield on October 15. In making this move he joined his home-town club after six years with Huddersfield.

## THEIR MANAGER

BEFORE transfer fees soared to their present level, more money changed hands over Don Revie than any other player. Starting his career with Leicester City (whom he helped to reach the F.A. Cup Final in 1949, though missing Wembley through injury), he later played for Hull City, Manchester City-where he had a tactical forward plan named after him -Sunderland and Leeds. He signed for Leeds in 1958 and was appointed player-manager in March 1961, on the resignation of Mr. Jack Taylor. He gave up playing 12 months later. Last weekend Don Revie underwent an appendicitis operation, and we wish him a speedy return to fitness and football.
