THE TALK OF STAMFORD BRIDGE

A WEEK ago we received the following letter from the Football League:-

The Secretary, Chelsea F.C. Ltd., Stamford Bridge, Fulham Road, LONDON, S.W.6

Dear Mr. Battersby,

Manchester United versus Chelsea Saturday, 15th October, 1966.

At the Meeting of the Management Committee on Sunday, I felt it my duty to report to them that not only was the standard of Football in this game at a very high level, but that everyone I spoke to was impressed by the behaviour of the spectators.

Both sets of supporters were in good voice throughout the afternoon, which contributed, I think, to the enjoyment of the match, and I personally could not hear anything to which anyone could take objection.

The Management Committee felt that there has been so much criticism, that it was a pleasure to them to be able to write to the Clubs to compliment their supporters on a standard of behaviour which gives the Management Committee encouragement to believe that the very high standard set on Saturday will be maintained in the future.

We have replied to Mr. Hardaker, thanking him for his letter, and pass on here the favourable comments it contained for the benefit of all Chelsea Supporters, and particularly those of you who travelled to Old Trafford.

BACK at The Bridge: Trainer's box view of our League Cup replay with Blackpool for Peter Osgood. It was in the original game at Blackpool that he broke his right leg, and defeat in the return match completed a dismal double in this tie for Peter and Chelsea. Trainer Harry Medhurst, himself getting over a cartilage operation, shares the picture with "Ossie". Come on, lads, after two defeats running at Stamford Bridge, let's send the "walking wounded" — as well as the fans home happy tonight! Another letter to reach us on the same day referred to the conduct of some of our home Supporters in last week's League Cup replay against Blackpool.

Mr. B. A. Cann, of East Twickenham, wrote:

"Towards the end of the game with Blackpool, there was a disturbance on the terracing near the half-time scoreboard which resulted in about half a dozen policemen entering the crowd and dispersing it when the final whistle went.

"It was then possible to see that the police had surrounded a solitary young man whose only apparent need of protection was that he was wearing a tangerine-and-white scarf.

"Of course, visiting supporters often provoke — sometimes deliberately home supporters, but I cannot honestly believe that one young Blackpool fan provoked those around him to such an extent that he subsequently required police protection.

"The incident disgusted and angered me. Surely, Chelsea are not prepared to allow spectators to be subjected to domination by a minority of thugs whose blue-and-white favours serve only as an object for aggression? Surely the genuine supporters cannot stand and watch while this type of behaviour goes on, for their inactivity can only be interpreted as indifference, cowardice or acquiescence?

"Unless it is stamped out quickly and thoroughly, the game will continue to come into disrepute, retaliation on Chelsea supporters at away matches will probably follow and violence will become more widespread since supporters will collect in mobs to protect themselves.

"It can only be stamped out by the genuine supporters, and the time is rapidly approaching when these must stand up and be counted."

TOTTENHAM HOTSPUR

ONE factor embarrassingly common to Tottenham Hotspur and ourselves is the last match played by each club. Spurs met bottom-of-the-table Blackpool in the League eleven days ago, and lost their 100 per cent home record in a shock 1-3 defeat; two nights later Blackpool came to Stamford Bridge in the Football League Cup, and we were equally shocked to lose by the identical score.

Such are the ways of football. Tonight, it is back to the Championship task for both of us, with Spurs seeking to keep a 100 per cent record against London opponents in First Division matches this season (they have beaten Arsenal 3-1 at White Hartlane and Fulham 4-3 at Craven Cottage).

Their Careers Began Here

Two of our "old boys" will be in the opposition line-up: **Jimmy Greaves**, who left Chelsea in 1961 — joining Spurs via Milan A.C. — and **Terry Venables**, who was transferred to Tottenham last May in time to play in their final League game of the season.

An even newer star signing in the side is centre-half **Mike England**, whose transfer from Blackburn Rovers was completed on the eve of this season. England won his 21st full international cap for Wales against Scotland on Saturday, when Spurs had three other players selected for their countries — **Cliff Jones** as a second representative in the Welsh side, goalkeeper **Pat Jennings** for Northern Ireland and Greaves as an England reserve along with our own Peter Bonetti.

Indeed, at top strength the all-star Tottenham assembly includes *nine* full internationals, and the other two players are on the fringe of such honour. They are full-backs **Joe Kinnear**, who was well in the running for selection for Eire against Spain on Sunday, and **Cyril Knowles**, already an England Under-23 cap. An alternative full-back choice this season has been **Phil Beal**, four years a professional at White Hart-lane and an England Youth international.

Joining Mike England in an all-international middle-line are Alan Mullery (England) and club captain Dave Mackay (Scotland), who has come back to make his mark again in top-class soccer after twice breaking a leg.

Completing the international forward line, along with Greaves, Venables and Jones, are two Scotland caps, **Jimmy Robertson** on the right wing and centreforward **Alan Gilzean**.

With Scottish international goalkeeper Bill Brown recently transferred to Northampton, 21-year-old **Roy Brown** made his debut in Tottenham's last game. He may be on duty again tonight because Jennings, still troubled by an ankle injury, was able to play in only the first half for Ireland against England on Saturday.

Spurs have scored in all but one of their 12 First Division games this season. The exception was the away match with Stoke City which they lost two-nil.

Greaves is easily Spurs' leading scorer for 1966-67 with nine goals out of 24. The full list reads: Greaves 9, Gilzean 6, Mullery 2, Robertson 2, Jones 1, Knowles 1, Mackay 1, Saul 1, Venables 1.
