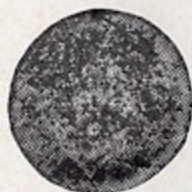

## **The Talk of Stamford Bridge**

**W**E come to the season's last first-team home game still with a target firmly in our sights—a final League placing that will qualify us for European football again next season, in the U.E.F.A. Cup. How high that will need to be is impossible to forecast with any certainty as so many factors are involved. Meanwhile we must do our best and hope for the best, too.

At some grounds the League season will continue well into May, but in one important respect our own "home" season is ending too soon.

Just too soon for us to fulfil hopes that in our last Programme of 1971-72 we would be able to announce the full, exciting plans for the redevelopment of Stamford Bridge. All through the season we have said that when we announced these plans they would be full and comprehensive. That pledge still holds . . . which is why, with one or two essential aspects about to be finalised, they are not quite ready for release.

In thanking you for your splendid support again this season, we also thank you for your continued patience in bearing with us while awaiting news of the redevelopment of our Stadium. We are disappointed ourselves that it is not in tonight's Programme, but in the next few weeks we shall be issuing a special brochure which will set out full details of the **NEW STAMFORD BRIDGE**. We shall do so confident that when you see them you will appreciate that this short extra delay was worthwhile.

**Welcome, Stoke:** For our final home League game of the season tonight we welcome our friends and respected adversaries, Stoke City. This match was originally scheduled for March 4 but instead we clashed that day in the League Cup Final. Obviously enjoying the taste of success, Stoke continued in inspiring form in the F.A. Cup in a magnificent bid to reach Wembley twice in the same season. Only at the semi-final stage—and then by 2-1 in a replay against the holders, Arsenal, at Goodison Park last Wednesday—was the second dream shattered. But Stoke had already made history, and we offer them heartiest congratulations on their marvellous season.

**Two to play:** After tonight we are left with two First Division fixtures, both away. On Thursday night we go to West Bromwich, and at the time of going to press we are still waiting for the Football League to decide the date of the season's final League game away to Leeds United.

There are two matches to come at Stamford Bridge: On Saturday we play our final Football Combination fixture here against Reading (3 p.m.) and next Monday (7.30 p.m.) we receive Coventry City in the first leg of the Southern Junior Floodlit Cup Final. The second leg is at Coventry on Friday, May 5.

**Three in Brazil:** We shall have three players taking part in the "mini World Cup" in Brazil in June. As already announced, Charlie Cooke is in Scotland's squad, and Paddy Mulligan and John Dempsey have been "asked for" by the Republic of Ireland. Alan Hudson is in the England Under-23 party to tour East Germany, Poland and Russia, also in June.

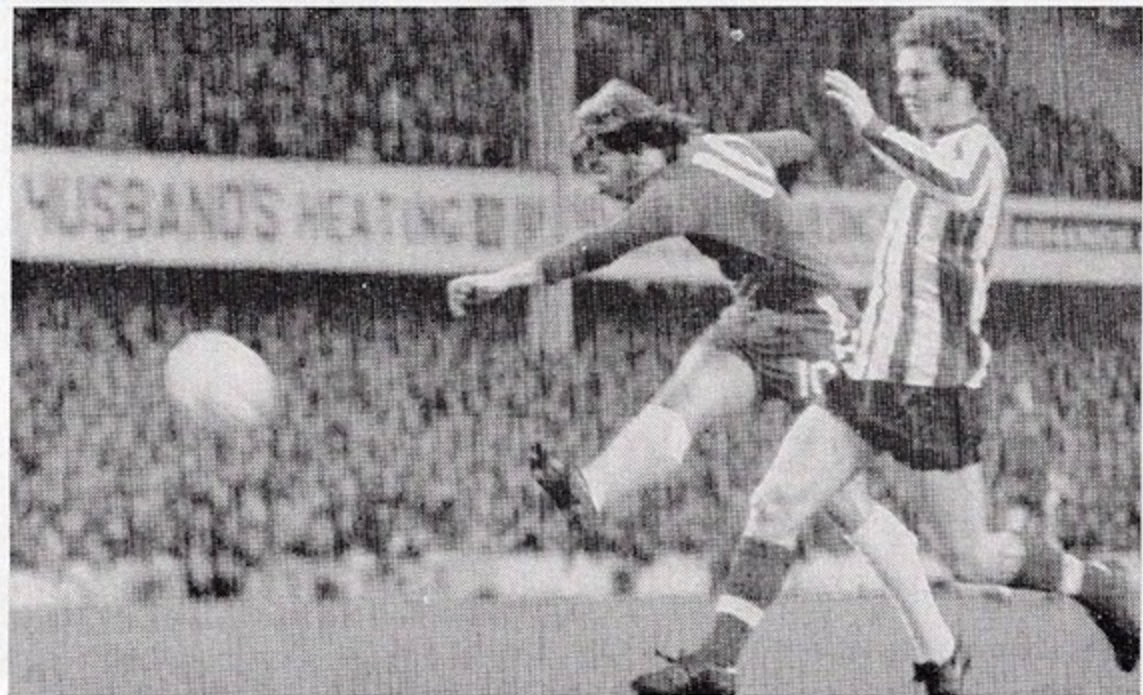


Our first equaliser at The Dell last Tuesday. Tommy Baldwin, close-marked, does very well to score with this header from John Dempsey's cross.

# BETWEEN OURSELVES

Programme Editor

SOMETIMES the *Footballer of the Year* just about picks himself; at others one is not entirely convinced that the Football Writers' choice would be the fans' nomination, because situations (League Championship climaxes and Cup Finals) have been known to creep in and swing the voting at the expense of individual performance over the whole season. There can be little doubt, though, about the right fellow receiving the trophy at the Cafe Royal a week on Thursday. This is the 25th year of the award and if, by way of celebration, the silver jubilee called for an extra special winner, then who better than Gordon Banks? On reflection, it's astonishing that he has not previously won the title—he's been the world's No. 1 goalkeeper for years now—but then goalkeepers do not figure prominently in the list of past winners. Bert Trautmann, in 1956, is the only one.

Banks more than any other Stoke player prevented Chelsea winning the League Cup at Wembley last month, and in view of his latest award I'm sure all you sporting Chelsea fans will salute him tonight . . . assuming, that is, he's playing and not taking a rest after Stoke's recent run of six games in 18 days. He's got to learn his speech some time!

Just as most comedians yearn to play Hamlet, so most goalkeepers want to play outfield—at least in the occasional training spell—so it was interesting to hear Bobby Charlton say recently, when paying tribute to Banks's supreme skills, that in all the years he's known him he has never seen Gordon anywhere but between the posts. "Brilliant as he is, he just wants to go on practising and getting better at his particular job," said Bobby. Dedication and professionalism like this have made Banks what he is . . . but don't let it stop the Chelsea lads trying to stick a couple past him tonight.

If Gordon Banks is *Footballer of the Year*, the *Crowd of the Year* has got to be Liverpool's. If not for the way they've helped Bill Shankly's men in their phenomenal late rush towards the Championship, then the Kop and all the rest who fill Anfield earned the accolade two weeks ago. On a pelting night 56,214—another 5,000 were locked out—turned up to honour their former star Roger Hunt in his testimonial match. And that for a player who left the club three seasons ago. Marvellous people!

*Manager of the Year*? Like the *Footballer of the Year*, he could be among us tonight—hasn't Tony Waddington done miracles with Stoke this season?—unless Leeds do the Double under Don Revie.

That would make Leeds *Team of the Year*. Otherwise Hartlepool deserve consideration . . . and I'm not joking. Not many people outside the North-east have noticed what they've been up to lately. On the day Chelsea and Stoke met at Wembley, only seven weeks ago, Hartlepool stood 92nd in the Football League. They'd applied for re-election for the past two seasons and were relegated the year before that . . . and if anyone was going to have to make room for Hereford to come into the League this summer it was surely Hartlepool. Then they started winning, and could hardly stop. They've had eight victories and a draw in their last twelve games. Yes, for a club who've had to seek re-election ten times in their history, it borders on *Team of the Year* rating.

On that fairy-story note, farewell until next season. And as you leave Stamford Bridge tonight, take a last look at the East Stand that's been here almost as long as there's been a Chelsea Football Club. Say goodbye to old George Hilsdon, that roof-top weather-vane figure who's looked down on matters Chelsea for more than half a century. For this is the end of an age. By the time we gather again in August the East Stand won't be here. As you are about to hear soon, its super-successor will be under construction. Till then . . . go well, keep well and summer well.

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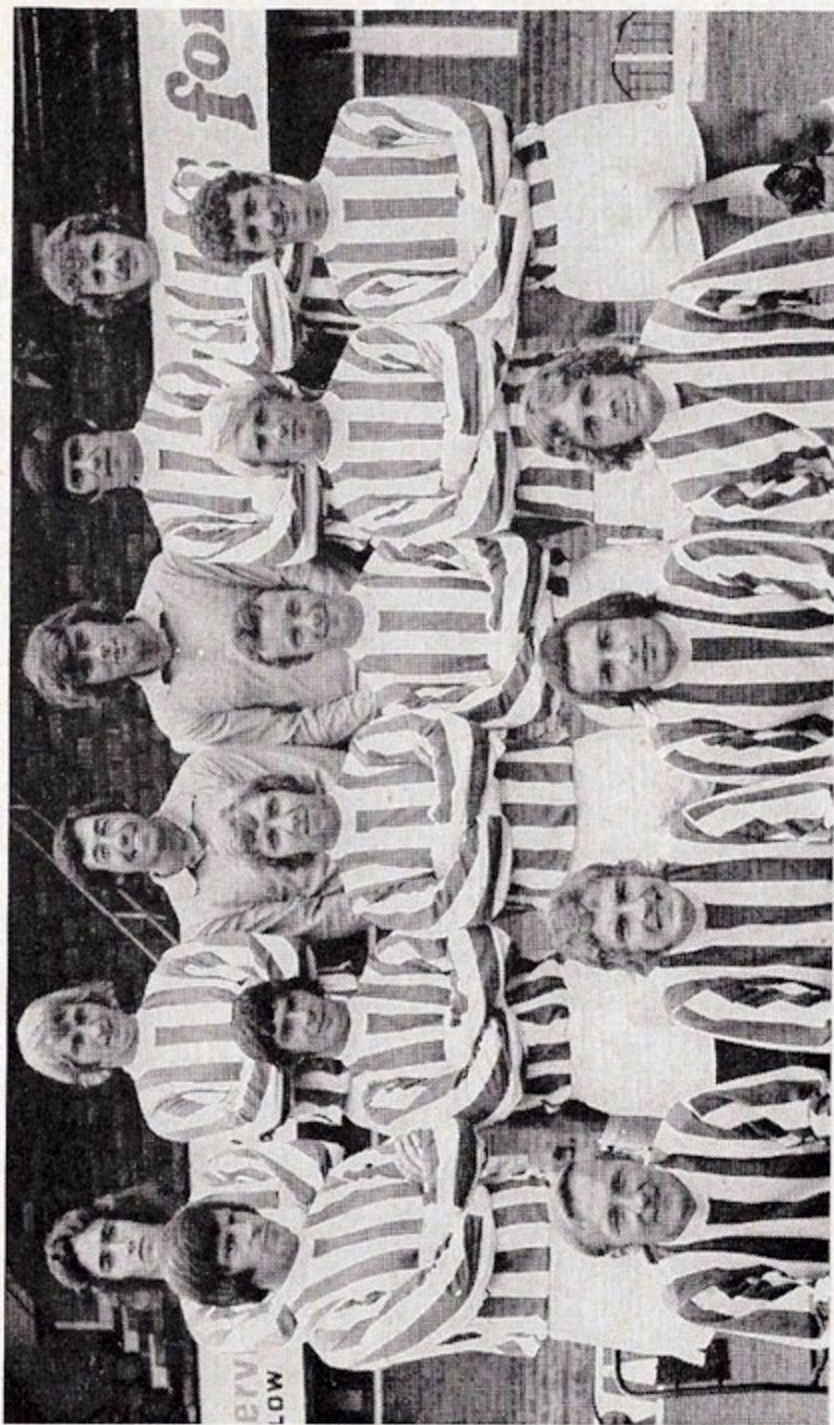

THE shattering noise heard lately over the Five Towns has been not the sound of broken pottery, but of Stoke City smashing club records. The most important one was achieved at our expense, the League Cup triumph at Wembley bringing City the first major honour in their 109-year existence.

As a result, they are set for another "first" next season as contenders in European football for the first time. And at least one other Stoke record has been beaten this season in the number of matches played. Tonight's game is their 62nd competitive fixture of 1971-72 (League, League Cup, F.A. Cup and Texaco Cup), and with four more First Division matches to come they will total 66 games before the curtain comes down on the most rewarding season in their history.

## THEIR PLAYERS

**GORDON BANKS:** World-class goalkeeper with 69 England caps, a record for his position, and the man who foiled us at Wembley last month. Began with Chesterfield, moved to Leicester City in 1959, and in April 1967 transferred to Stoke at a £55,000 fee. Worthy winner of this season's Footballer of the Year award, announced last week. Born Sheffield. 6 ft. 1 in., 13 st. 7 lb.

**JOHN MARSH:** Speedy full-back who established a regular place shortly after his debut in season 1967-68. Has since made over 100 League appearances. Wears contact lenses. Born Stoke. 5 ft. 9 in., 11 st.

**STUART JUMP:** Reliable young defender who played schools football for Manchester before joining Stoke as an apprentice. Made League debut against Coventry in February 1971. Born Prestwich. 5 ft. 9 in., 11 st. 2 lb.

**MIKE BERNARD:** Tenacious midfield grafter who made three England Under-23 appearances last season. Joined Stoke from Shrewsbury Schoolboys and made League debut in 1966. Born Shrewsbury. 5 ft. 8½ in., 11 st. 10 lb.

**DENIS SMITH:** 24-year-old centre-half who has overcome ten broken bones, including four leg

fractures, in his career with City. Joined them from local schools football, and made League debut at Highbury in 1969. Born Stoke. 6 ft., 12 st. 7 lb.

**ALAN BLOOR:** Another local schools product and one of the most experienced members of the side—debut in 1961. Forms an excellent defensive partnership with Denis Smith. Born Stoke. 6 ft., 13 st. 7 lb.

**TERRY CONROY:** Red-haired Eire international winger signed by Stoke from Glentoran for £12,000 in March 1967. Fast, direct and scorer of Stoke's first goal against us in the League Cup Final. Born Dublin. 5 ft. 10½ in., 10 st. 7 lb.

**PETER DOBING:** Stoke's captain missed last season's F.A. Cup semi-final because of a broken leg, but gained ample consolation at Wembley a few weeks ago, when he hoisted the League Cup. Previously with Blackburn and Man. City, he joined Stoke from City for £25,000 in August 1963. Born Manchester. 5 ft. 9½ in., 11 st. 9 lb.

**JOHN RITCHIE:** Is Stoke's top scorer for the third successive season with 20 goals before last Saturday. In his second spell with City, having left to join Sheffield Wednesday in November 1966 and returned in July 1969. Born Kettering. 6 ft. 1 in., 13 st.

**GEORGE EASTHAM:** At 35 his League Cup-winning goal against us at Wembley crowned a distinguished career which spans Irish League Ards, Newcastle and Arsenal, from whom he joined Stoke for £30,000 in August 1966. Spent last summer in S. Africa as manager of Capetown Hellenic. England International (19 caps). Born Blackpool. 5 ft. 7 in., 10 st. 6 lb.

**JIMMY GREENHOFF:** Striker who cost Stoke's record fee of £100,000 when signed from Birmingham in August 1969. Originally with Leeds, he is an England Under-23 International (4 caps). Born Barnsley. 5 ft. 9 in., 12 st. 6 lb.

**JOHN MAHONEY:** Welsh International (4 caps) signed from Crewe for £19,500 in March 1967. Although unable to establish a regular first-team place this season has frequently been substitute. Born Cardiff. 5 ft. 7½ in., 11 st. 1 lb.

# TALK - BACK

Completing this season's special series of interviews with the Chelsea first-team "pool". . .

## PETER OSGOOD



<b>Family details:</b>	Wife Rosemary, sons Anthony (6) and Mark (5). We live at Tadworth, overlooking Epsom racecourse—we've been there about a year—and the family pet is a labrador called Toby.
<b>Experiences this season:</b>	I've always been a slow starter—I mean to do something about that when next season opens—but being put on the transfer list last August after two games made it even worse. That hit me hard but, looking back, it did me good. I've got the goals to prove it, and when I scored away to Wolves the week before last I equalled my previous best total for a season, 31 in 1969-70. I'm still hoping that injury at Tottenham nine days ago didn't finish my season.
<b>Life on the goal-front:</b>	You're bound to miss a fellow like Hutch when he's not around (between us we got 53 goals two years ago) and when his leg went at the start of the season, I thought I'd do no good. But I've enjoyed the extra responsibility up front. David Webb has helped me—he shares the high crosses, upsets defenders and that's been to my advantage. And I've been terrifically impressed with Chris Garland. He's a great-hearted runner, he's been scoring goals and I can see him becoming a great player.
<b>The 1972 Chelsea squad:</b>	Doc split up what we thought was a great side, but the difference is that this squad has been successful . . . won big things for Chelsea. John Boyle has come back lately and done well, and there's fellows like John Phillips, Eddie McCreadie, Tommy Baldwin ready to step in. Yes, this is the strongest squad we've ever had.
<b>The refs' "revolution"</b>	It's improved the game, although a lot of the cautions have been harsh. Ball players are not being clobbered as much as before, so I must have benefited . . . but I've had five bookings, too. Different players have different temperaments. In my case, things happen on the spur of the moment . . . you lose your biscuit for a few seconds, and I always regret it afterwards.
<b>Business interests outside football:</b>	I'm an area sales manager for Fords around Slough, and this has worked out well for me. I have a weekly column in several provincial papers, and next month I'm opening a women's dress shop with a friend, Alan Phillips, at Mitcham.
<b>Career ambitions:</b>	To help Chelsea win the League Championship next year and then get a crack at the European Cup. That's the big one. Meanwhile, I desperately want us to be in next season's U.E.F.A. Cup. I enjoy European football more than anything else—the do-or-die atmosphere, the night-time setting gets me keyed right up. Winning my first England cap away to Belgium two seasons ago (followed by two World Cup appearances as substitute in Mexico) was a real kick. I'd love to play for England at Wembley . . . watched by my father.
